Apprenticeships are gaining popularity, offering a diverse array of courses. From health to engineering, the range of available programmes has grown significantly in recent years.

This guide should answer most of your questions, but here are some other key points you may want to know...

Benefits of an Apprenticeship:

Earn While You Learn:

Apprentices receive a salary and are entitled to paid annual leave

No Student Debt:

Training costs are covered by the employer and the government, so apprentices can gain qualifications without incurring student debt

Career Progression:

Apprenticeships provide a solid foundation for career advancement, with opportunities for further studies and promotions

What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a paid job that includes formal training. Apprentices work for an employer while also studying to gain industry-recognised qualifications.

How can you help?

You can help by researching apprenticeship options, understanding the application process, and discussing career goals.

Is an apprenticeship a real job?

Apprentices have the same employment rights as other employees, including a minimum wage, holiday allowance, and sick pay. They also have protected time for studying, known as "off-the-job training".

At the University of Northampton, we work with our students and apprentices with disabilities to help achieve their full potential and to promote equal opportunities.

As an apprentice, even though you will not be on campus five days a week, you are still our responsibility. We aim to provide a safe and happy workplace where you can thrive and not be overlooked because of your differences.

Having a disability should never stop you from pursuing your dream career.

Our **Additional Student Support and Inclusion Services Team** (**ASSIST**) is here for you. ASSIST aims to enable students to access all aspects of university life and take control of their learning. This is underpinned by a commitment to accessibility and respect for confidentiality.

ASSIST provides support for apprentices, examples include:

- · physical impairments
- sensory impairments
- · mental health difficulties
- · medical conditions, for example epilepsy
- · Autistic spectrum disorders
- · specific learning difficulties, for example dyslexia



BUSTING APPRENTICESHIP MYTHS

There are many misconceptions about apprenticeships, so let's set the record straight.

Apprenticeships are only for new employees

Apprenticeships can be for new employees, but they are also a fantastic way for existing employees to upskill, gain new qualifications, and advance their careers within their current workplace.

Apprenticeships are for only trade industries

Apprenticeships are not limited to trade industries. They are available in diverse fields such as technology, healthcare, digital marketing, finance, and even creative arts. This variety allows individuals to gain practical experience and qualifications in a wide range of professions.

Apprentices are poorly paid

While the national minimum wage for apprentices is £7.55 per hour (as of April 2025), apprentices in the East Midlands region typically earn more competitive salaries. Our current higher and degree apprentices at the University of Northampton earn average starting salaries between £18,000 and £26,000, varying by sector and employer.

Apprentices gain hands-on experience, learn practical skills, and contribute to real projects under the guidance of experienced professionals. This valuable training prepares them for successful careers in their chosen fields.

Apprentices just make the tea and coffee Apprenticeships are for people who aren't 'academically inclined'

Apprenticeships are for everyone. They offer a practical, hands-on approach to learning that complements academic skills and can lead to advanced qualifications, including degrees.

Apprenticeships are only for 16 to 18 year-olds

Apprenticeships are not just for 16 to 18 year-olds. People of all ages can benefit from apprenticeships, whether they are starting their careers, changing professions, or upskilling within their current jobs.

There is no upper age limit, making apprenticeships a versatile option for lifelong learning.

An apprenticeship is the easy way out of education

Apprenticeships combine rigorous on-the-job training with classroom instruction, requiring dedication and hard work.
Apprentices gain valuable skills and qualifications that prepare them for successful careers, often at advanced levels.

An apprenticeship doesn't lead to a full-time job

Apprenticeships often lead to full-time employment. A significant percentage of apprentices secure permanent positions after completing their course.

KEY DIFFERENCES BETWEEN APPRENTICESHIPS...

After finishing school or college, most students choose to go to university full-time or do an apprenticeship. It can be a challenge to make this decision, so let's go through the key differences.

You will get real-life experience working alongside your qualification

You will need to balance working and studying at the same time


You will get paid a salary just like a normal employee

You will get a graduation ceremony when you finish

It is fully paid for, so there is no cost to you

You won't qualify for any student loans

You will choose the employer/location



APPRENTICESHIP LEVELS EXPLAINED

Apprenticeships in the UK are structured into different levels, each catering to varying degrees of experience and education. The duration of the course is typically longer for apprenticeships that offer a higher qualification.

The different levels provide a structured pathway for career development, allowing you to earn while you learn and gain valuable work experience.



Here is a breakdown of the different paths you could take.

Level 8 - Doctorate

Level 7 – Master's Degree / Higher & Degree Apprenticeships

Level 6 – Undergraduate Degree / Higher & Degree Apprenticeships

Level 5 – Undergraduate Degree / Foundation Degree / Higher Diploma / Higher Apprenticeships

Level 4 - Undergraduate Degree / Foundation Degree / Higher National Certificate / Higher Apprenticeships


Level 3 – A Level / A2 / AS / BTEC Nationals / Advanced Apprenticeships

FINDING A SUITABLE JOB

In order to be able to do an apprenticeship, you must have a job role relevant to the topic you wish to study. There are different ways to find a job that is suitable for the course you would like to do.

We understand that it can be a daunting process but if you are willing to put in the hard work then the results will follow. Here are some tips to guide you.



Approach employers directly with a CV, express your interest in working for them as an apprentice



Visit the site: gov.uk/applyapprenticeship to see what is available



Look at online job sites by typing in apprenticeship e.g. Indeed or LinkedIn

What types of companies offer these apprenticeships?

A wide range of organisations offer **higher and degree apprenticeships**, including:

- Large multinational corporations (e.g. Rolls-Royce, BAE Systems)
- Public sector organisations (NHS, Civil Service)
- Professional services firms (PwC, Deloitte)
- · Engineering companies
- Financial institutions
- Technology companies

Many smaller and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) also offer apprenticeships, so it's always worth asking even if it's not advertised.

APPRENTICESHIP APPLICATION JOURNEY

Now you know more about apprenticeships, all there is left to do is apply to the employer. Each apprenticeship is different and may require different information but here are the main steps to take.

Application Form

Submit an application to the employer, not the university.

CV

Match your skills with the job description in your CV and apply them to real examples.

Assessments

These tests are designed to measure your suitability for the job.

Cover Letter

Write a cover letter to back up the reasons why you're the right person for the iob.

Interview

You will be invited for a face-to-face or online interview - don't forget to dress to impress!

Assessment Day

This may be a day full of tasks or activities, interviews, group projects, presentations and more.

Applications often open nearly a year before the start date, similar to graduate schemes.

At the University of Northampton we hold regular apprenticeship information sessions and offer one-to-one guidance through our dedicated apprenticeships team.

I got the job!

Congratulations! Don't think it gets easier from here. Continue researching the company, plan your route and prepare yourself.

I didn't get the job - what now?

Rejection can be hard, but do not give up. Keep applying and look at ways to improve your CV.

I've not heard back - what does this mean?

Don't take it personally but also be patient. If you are really wanting to find out and you've not heard back for a while, make contact and you may get an answer.


